From the Pastor's Desk ...

But an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, ..." [Matt 1:20]

As our thoughts and hearts turn to God during the coming Holy Week, there is a special, often overlooked day on the church calendar that gives us a chance to reflect on the example of Jesus' earthly father Joseph. We call him "the Guardian of Our Lord," and his is a story of stewardship with God's greatest gift to humanity, Jesus Christ.

Joseph is a silent figure in the Bible. We do not know very much about him. What we do know, is that he was a man who chose compassion over judgment. His loving spirit supported Mary, and then later led him to be the fatherly guide of the "Holy Child" who would be the savior of the world. Joseph teaches us that a life of compassion is a life lived to the glory and honor of God. In Joseph we see that a compassionate person's life is one of God's best tools for peace in the world.

As Christians, we are called to study scripture as a means to understand how God calls his disciples to live. The Bible tells us the stories of everyday people, with all their warts and scars revealed. Hearing their stories, we see in them how God is always working to open even the most deeply flawed and broken people (like ourselves) to the amazing possibilities God has in mind for his servants.

Joseph's story is important even though he has no lines to speak. The utter compassion in his heart speaks volumes and teaches us that if we will be guided by compassion for others instead of judgment, we will be truly amazed by all the ways God will use us to make things better in His creation.

Happy April, hoping for April showers to moisten our soil so we can have May flowers.

1. Thank you to all the members (31) that attended the Congregational Meeting on March 23. If you were not able to attend, a copy of the presentation can be sent to you by requesting it from Kathy Gable in the church office. The follow-up meeting will be April 6 where we can have discussions about changes to our constitution based on direc-

The follow-up meeting will be April 6 where we can have discussions about changes to our constitution based on direction from the ELCA. This will be held in the Fellowship Hall following a potluck meal. If you haven't done so, see the sign-up sheet in the entryway bulletin board.

- 2. At the March meeting, Council approved a recommendation by Sue Luchka to start a Parish Nurse program. This will be added to our governing documents as a Continuing Resolution. Watch for information and signs starting in April. Sue is a registered nurse with training as an educator. She will start by offering blood pressure testing on Sunday mornings, once a month. This will be expanded to include subject matter information in the newsletter later in the year. Sue may be looking for volunteers with medical background to help as the program takes off.
- 3. For some reason we are having trouble with ZOOM connections for streaming our Council meetings. Several people are working on this, and we hope to have it fixed for April. We have paid our bills:).
- 4. Kathy Gable is putting together a list of members with keys to the building. If you no longer need your key, please return it. If you have a key and want to keep it, make sure Kathy Gable is aware of it.
- 5. Lots of things are going on in the church. Check the announcements in the bulletin, the bulletin boards at church and the website.
- 6. We need a Property Manager. Rod does an excellent job of maintaining the church property and grounds. Someone is needed to do the paperwork/organizing/follow up around selling the rental property, upgrading systems like the boiler, general contracts for preventive maintenance. If interested, please see Ellen Gibb or any member of Council. This is a paid part time position.
- 7. Notice the new dusk to dawn lights donated and installed by Kirk and Marilyn Leeser. They provide light to the dark corners of the church building/parking lots.

- 8. Reminder that we need 3-4 people to participate on the committee for the 175th anniversary of Mt. Zion in 2026. A member of the Council will be the chair, but they need a committee to help plan and organize.
- 9. Volunteer opportunity

Mt. Zion Lutheran and Mt. Zion UCC churches provide a meal for folks in York City. We are responsible for green beans and potatoes, Mt. Zion UCC provides the rest of the ingredients and delivers them to Our Daily Bread. Our day of providing food is whenever there are five Tuesdays in a month - April, July, September and December for 2025.

Carol and Tom Trainor have volunteered to deliver the 12 #10 cans of green beans.

I will need volunteers to buy, peel, cut and deliver 20 pounds of Russett potatoes to Mt. Zion UCC on Ridgewood Road at 10 am on the Monday before. Dates listed on sign-up sheet.



WORSHIP VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

We are always looking for more worship volunteers in the following capacities:

Usher: Greet worshipers with a friendly smile as they enter the sanctuary and direct them to pick up a bulletin before finding their seat before the service, and provide direction during communion from the pews to the rail.



Lector: Read the lessons and psalm of the day. Lessons are provided for you to practice ahead of time.

Lay Assistant: Assist Pastor in leading worship by reading the prayers and serving the wine at communion.

Communion Assistant: Light/extinguish candles, receive the offering plate, and assist with the distribution of communion by dismissing congregants from the rail to return to their seats.

Altar Guild: Prepare for communion before the service, and clean-up after the service. Those interested can sign up on the bulletin board outside of the sanctuary, one week at a time, as often as you would like.

The schedule for worship volunteers (with the exception of altar guild) is done 3 months at a time, with the next schedule starting in December. 

April Prayer Ventures

These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the ELCA, as well as for the needs and circumstances of our neighbors, communities and world. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

- 1 Pray for lasting peace between nations and for the healing of people who suffer conflict, war and violence, especially in Ukraine, Russia, Gaza, Israel, Syria, Haiti, Myanmar and regions of Africa.

 2 Arab American Heritage Month Give thanks for the contributions and impact of Arab Americans in every aspect of society, including religion, education, science, business, government and the arts. Ask God to bless and further the work of ELCA Arab and Middle Eastern Ministries and the Association of Lutherans of Arab and Middle Eastern Heritage.
- 3 "You have come down to the lakeshore seeking neither the wise nor the wealthy, but only asking for me to follow" (WOV 784). Praise God for seeking us out and, despite our imperfection, making us humble disciples, equipped and inspired by the Spirit.
- 4 Pray for church leaders, liturgists, scholars and scientists gathering to discuss including the Feast of Creation Day in liturgical calendars, an effort organized by the Roman Catholic Church in partnership with the Lutheran World Federation, World Council of Churches, World Methodist Council, Anglican Communion and World Communion of Reformed Churches. Ask the Spirit to guide their study and discussion of climate justice, the Nicene Creed, the role of the Holy Trinity in creation, and how Christians engage with the creation story.
- 5 Remember in prayer worship leaders and musicians participating in the ecumenical Music that Makes Community workshop in Waco, Texas, a day of building community through singing, learning and fellowship.
- 6 Pray for a spirit of humble generosity that recognizes and encourages the diverse gifts and contributions of our siblings in Christ, who give as they are able and are inspired by their gratitude towards and love for God.
- 7 Praise the Creator for the new life of an emerging spring, which inspires our joy, awe and hope.
 8 There are about 390,000 people in foster care in our country, ranging from infants to young adults.
 Pray that these young people will experience love, understanding, security and encouragement in their foster families. Give thanks for foster parents and remember those young adults who, aging out of

- foster care, may face new uncertainties.
- 9 Seek God's forgiveness and mercy for the times when we have hurt, offended or demeaned others, intentionally or unintentionally. Pray for the Spirit to grant us humility, penitent hearts and a compassion that stirs us to make amends and heal broken relationships.
- 10 Lift up in prayer farmers, ranchers and agricultural workers. Give thanks for their efforts to feed the world and care for creation, and pray for abundant harvests.
- 11 Give thanks that God is always doing something new in and through us, wonderful things that impact others when they witness Christ's awesome love reflected in our lives as disciples.
- 12 Pray for youth in our congregations and communities, recognizing the challenges they face, celebrating the joys they experience and showing gratitude for what they add to our faith communities, which need the gifts of all generations to do God's work in the world.
- 13 Palm Sunday Pray that we might accompany Jesus in his journey of persecution, suffering, death and resurrection, a journey of love and sacrifice for our sake.
- 14 Pledge to bear hope, grace and newness in Christ to our neighbors in need, especially those who are poor, hungry, sick, imprisoned, unemployed or plagued by war or domestic conflict.
- 15 Praise God for the strength we draw from Scripture, from our siblings in Christ, from living in community and from the tireless work of the ever present Spirit.
- 16 Pray to the Lord for comfort, strength and renewed faith when you feel broken and worn-out.
- 17 Maunday Thursday Today we end our observation of Lent and shift our attention to what God has done for the world through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, son of God and son of humankind. Give thanks for the gift of new life in Christ, a life wrapped in God's boundless grace.
- 18 Good Friday "Start being brave about everything. Drive out darkness and spread light. Don't look at your weaknesses. Realize instead that in Christ crucified you can do everything" (Catherine of Siena, 1347-1380). Pray for the Spirit to strengthen our faith so that, through us, God's love and mercy might shine brightly in the world.
- 19 Ask the Spirit for a faith that is certain and

resilient, even when we don't fully understand or appreciate what God has done for humanity through Iesus Christ.

20 Easter Day Sing praise and thanksgiving to God! This is the day the Lord has made for us to gather as loved and forgiven children, celebrating our freedom from the bondage of sin and death.

21 When you reflect on who might need your presence, comfort and reassuring words of love and hope, who comes to mind? Include them in your prayers and reach out to them.

22 Give thanks and pray for directors for evangelical mission, who serve in partnership with ELCA churchwide ministries and synods, helping them to found "new start" ministries, renew congregations, nurture stewardship, and identify, develop and equip leaders for ministry.

23 Every day, Jesus walks with us, sharing good news and wisdom just as he did with Cleopas and his companion on the road to Emmaus. Pray that the Spirit will help us express that good news and wisdom in our conversations with our neighbors.

24 "We are not fed by only doing one way of ministry. Instead it is about seeing the face of God in every person who walks through the door, about embracing the inherent dignity of every individual, regardless of their circumstances" (the Rev. Esther K. Sianipar, "Serving With Shobi's Table: A Reflection," shobistable.org). Pray for our neighbors who suffer hunger, lack reliable access to nutritious food and yearn for the support of caring communities, and thank God for our congregational, synodical and churchwide ministries that serve them without bias or judgment.

25 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Alaska Synod, Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod and Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.

26 Thank God for the spiritual nourishment we receive when we gather around the table to celebrate communion, and for the Triune God, who calls and equips us to do God's work in the world.

27 Like the apostle Thomas, we all experience moments of doubt and disbelief. Pray that God will be patient and forgiving with us, rekindling our trust in a Spirit that helps us when our faith weakens.

28 Thank God for volunteers who respond to the needs of the church and society by sharing their time, gifts and passion. Pray that we will extend to people of all ages the invitation to serve God.

29 Pray for those who suffer the trauma of gun violence in their communities and elsewhere. Ask for wisdom in responding to our stricken neighbors, for guidance in working to ending gun violence and for fearless respect for human life — a precious gift from God, our creator.

30 Again, we rejoice and shout, "Hallelujah! The Lord, our savior, is risen!" The good news and power of Easter that we experience cannot be confined to a single calendar day

ALTAR FLOWERS

We are accustomed to seeing flowers on the altar every Sunday throughout

the year except during Advent and Lent. These flowers are not simply decorations; they are an integral part of our worship that help to draw our attention to the focal point of the chancel area — the Altar. They serve as a reminder of God's creation and the bounty of His handiwork. That said, it is time to fill in the list for 2024.



Sponsoring these flowers is very simple:

- 1. Decide when you want to sponsor altar flowers, one week or multiple weeks; it's not necessary to have a specific reason, but if you do, simply indicate that on an order form always available in the pocket under "Flowers" on the bulletin board in the hallway beside Pastor's office.
- 2. Choose as many dates as you wish. If you have no specific dates in mind, simply indicate that you want to sponsor a Sunday, or again, any number of Sundays.
- 3. Complete the order form, making sure to include your envelope number, a check for the amount ordered, and place it in a green envelope, or in your regular weekly envelope, and put it in either the offering box or offering plate. COST OF FLOWERS: \$35 FOR EACH VASE.

Each year there are 44 Sundays when we have flowers on the altar. Sponsoring these flowers is a perfect way to honor God and show that you understand and value stewardship to the church.
